This Course is designed to give you the opportunity to:				

- develop the intellectual skills appropriate for an honours degree;
- provide you with an academic and practice based education to enable you to satisfy the requirements of the Royal College of Occupational Therapy and the Health and Care Professions Council;
- develop the skills of an autonomous reflective practitioner who is able to provide leadership, to influence and respond appropriately to change;

- Learn with and from and about other healthcare professionals so that the new practitioner can contribute with skill and confidence to effective multiprofessional/multi-professional team working to ensure the needs of individuals and their family are addressed.

Subject-Based Practical skills

- Facilitate new practitioners' development as a change agent, able to critically evaluate the outcomes of interventions and service delivery strategies and respond to a dynamic practice environment.
- Contribute to the health and wellbeing of our society through the rigorous and considered application of occupational science to individuals, groups and populations.

Work or Study Placements

In order to be enrolled on this Course you must be employed by an organisation which offers or can organise the following work based opportunities: a range of pure physical, mental health and community/social care areas with apprentices working alongside a varied age range of service users.

It is acknowledged that the nature of the apprenticeship Course facilitates workbased learning and that apprentices have excellent opportunities to apply leaning in the practice setting, however, as part of your apprenticeship you will complete 6 compulsory assessed periods of practice.

In level 4 you will do one 5-week period of assessed practice (4 days a week) In level 5 you will do two 7-week periods of assessed practice (one 4 days a week and one 5 days a week)

In level 6 you will do two 7-week periods of assessed practice (both 5 days a week). During your final 7-week period of assessed practice you will also complete your apprenticeship End Point Assessment (TBC)

Course Structure

All courses are credit-rated to help you to understand the amount and level of study that is needed.

One credit is equal to 10 hours of directed study time (this includes everything you do e.g. lecture, seminar and private study).

Credits are assigned to one of 5 levels:

- 3 Equivalent in standard to GCE 'A' level and is intended to prepare students for year one of an undergraduate degree Course.
- 4 Equivalent in standard to the first year of a full-time undergraduate degree Course.
- 5 Equivalent in standard to the second year of a full-time undergraduate degree Course.
- 6 Equivalent in standard to the third year of a full-time undergraduate degree Course.
- 7 Equivalent in standard to a Masters degree.

Courses are made up of modules that are each credit weighted.

Additional detail about the course module structure:

A core module for a course is a module which a student must have passed (i.e. been awarded credit) in order to achieve the relevant named award. An optional module for a course is a module selected from a range of modules available on the course.

The overall credit-rating of this course is 360 credits. If for some reason you are unable to achieve this credit you may be entitled to an intermediate award, the level of the award will depend on the amount of credit you have accumulated. You can read the University Student Policies and Regulations on the UEL website.

Course Specific Regulations

Intervention and placement assessments have a non standard 40% threshold applied.

Learners who fail a practice-based learning component on substantiated grounds of fitness to practise concerns will be denied a retrieval attempt (RCOT Standard 6.4.1).

Completed hours of a failed practice-based learning component do not count towards the overall minimum requirement of 1000 hours practice-based learning hours (RCOT

Standard 6.4.2).

Learners are withdrawn from the course if they fail their second attempt at any practice-based learning component (RCOT Standard 6.4.3).

Learners are prevented from progressing in the course if they fail their first attempt at consecutive practice-based learning components (RCOT Standard 6.4.4). All assessments within the course leading to eligibility to apply to register as an occupational therapist with the HCPC must be successfully completed (i.e. no compensation of assessment is permitted) (RCOT Standard 4.11.1).

For learners in apprenticeship pre-registration courses, practice-based learning must be undertaken outside the learner's own work setting, ideally outside their employer's organisation (RCOT Standard 5.2.4).

In order to be awarded your apprenticeship you must pass your end point assessment

Typical Duration

The expected duration of this Course is 4 years full-time.

A student cannot normally continue study on a course after 4 years of study in full time mode unless exceptional circumstances apply and extenuation has been granted.

Attendance and engagement

For Occupational Therapy attendance is compulsory for all modules and is set at a 75% minimum. 100% attendance is required for practice-based learning.
